


Celebrating Deaf Culture: Raising the Deaf Flag at the Peterborough Square


Katie's Living My Best Life Musical Journey

Despite facing both hearing and visual impairments, music has remained a constant and vital part of her life. Since 2016, DeafBlind Ontario Services has been supporting Katie, and she continues to push the boundaries of what's possible for herself.

Katie's intervenors play a crucial role in supporting her journey, ensuring that she has ample opportunities to explore, experiment and practice music on her own terms. Intervenors are professionally trained to act as the "eyes" and "ears" of the person who is deafblind through the sense of touch. DeafBlind Ontario Services' professional intervenors foster independence through a holistic and person-centered approach of "do with, not for". They support people who are deafblind to gain independence, build their life skills, and take an active role in all areas of their lives.

Recently, Katie took a major step forward in her musical journey. As part of her Living My Best Life goals, she upgraded from an electric keyboard to a full-sized piano. This upgrade is more than just a new instrument—it's a stepping stone towards her goal of performing in public. The move to a full-sized piano gives Katie the space to further develop her skills, enhance her playing, and explore new musical possibilities.

Katie's love for music goes beyond playing the piano. She also enjoys writing her own music, a process that allows her to express herself and explore her creativity. Every week, she works with a music therapist to learn new songs and techniques, honing her craft and expanding her repertoire. Katie often records herself on her phone, listening back to perfect her playing. Katie's musical journey is a testament to her determination and passion. Recognizing International Week of Deaf People

According to the World Health Organization's 2021 World Report on Hearing, by 2050 approximately 2.5 billion people globally will be living with some degree of hearing loss, of whom at least 700 million will require rehabilitation services. As we mark International Week of Deaf People from September 23 to 29, 2024, we connected with Keith, who has been a part of DeafBlind Ontario Services' Supported Independent Living (SIL) Program for over 14 years.

Keith receives personalized support from Communication Support Professionals (CSPs) at DeafBlind Ontario Services. The role of a CSP is to empower individuals like Keith by helping them to facilitate the exchange of information to assist with communication, develop communication skills, understand new concepts, gather information, and build meaningful relationships. CSPs play an active role in fostering independence and participation in all aspects of the person's life.

With the support of his CSPs, Keith is able to enjoy being an active participant in his community. He enjoys attending social events, visiting historical sites and museums throughout Ontario, and spending quality time with friends and family. He's also an artist—he loves painting, working on creative projects, and decorating his apartment with festive, seasonal themes.

For Keith, communication is a crucial part of his everyday life. His preferred language is American Sign Language (ASL), and he's a passionate advocate for the Deaf community. He encourages those around him to learn ASL and often offers to teach it himself. "I wish more people knew ASL," Keith shares. "Especially when I'm at the store, so I could chat with more people."

As we geared up for International Week of Deaf People, Keith was excited to celebrate Deaf culture with his friends in the community. "I will be making art to celebrate Deaf culture and spending time with friends in the Deaf community".

Jocelyn Willoughby, a board member of DeafBlind Ontario Foundation, has always supported causes close to her heart. Her journey with the Foundation began when she sought to support a local charity in her community of Innisfil. A firefighter friend, familiar with the Foundation through one of the people we support who volunteered at the fire hall, recommended that Jocelyn connect with us.

After meeting with a member of the Foundation team, and inspired to take action, Jocelyn organized a golf tournament fundraiser for DeafBlind Ontario Foundation. The experience showed her the tangible impact of the Foundation's work, and she was deeply moved by our commitment to empower the people we serve. "The vulnerability of people with sensory loss resonated deeply with me," she reflects. "It's all about helping them gain independence, which is so important for everyone."

A Strategic and Heartfelt Decision

As a Senior Investment Advisor, Jocelyn understands the value of long-term planning. When considering her legacy, she knew she could make a significant impact through planned giving. "I don't have dependents, and while I want my family cared for, I also wanted to consider the bigger picture," she explains. "There are tax benefits to planned giving, and it ensures my money is used for good and not paying unnecessary tax."


Research Spotlight

Development of Global Framework on Deafblindness

The International Classification of Functioning, Disability, and Health (ICF) is a comprehensive framework used to describe and organize information related to functioning and disability. It provides a scientific foundation for understanding and studying health conditions, outcomes, determinants, and changes in health status and functioning.

Since the project's inception in 2020 during the preparatory phase, DeafBlind Ontario Services has played an integral role. We collaborated with academic researchers, recruited and facilitated the participation of individuals with lived experience, provided expert input, and contributed to the development of reports for publication.

Next steps include finalizing the first phase in October 2024 and developing the second phase in 2025.



United Nations Convention on Rights of Persons with Disabilities (UNCRPD) Monitoring

The Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities (CRPD) is an international human rights law that protects and promotes the rights and freedoms of persons with disabilities. Canada signed an agreement confirming its commitment to uphold the Convention in 2010.

Each country that agrees to uphold the CRPD needs to report on their progress every four years. Disability groups and human rights commissions also submit reports reflecting the lived experience of people with disabilities. After reviewing these reports and meeting with government representatives as well as disability groups, the UN Committee subsequently makes recommendations to the government about steps for improvement.

DeafBlind Ontario Services, in collaboration with Canadian disability organizations, contributed to the creation of a report for the UN Committee. Recently, we provided feedback on several UNCRPD articles (8, 9, 19, 21, and 31). Through our input, we emphasized the importance of ensuring that the individuals we support have access to information in their preferred communication methods. We also advocated for their inclusion in consultations, stressing the need to value their contributions by offering appropriate communication supports to help break down societal barriers.

Under the leadership of ARCH Disability Law Centre, the input from Canadian disability groups will be finalized in January 2025. The UN Committee is scheduled to review Canada's report in March 2025. Stay tuned for the final report in January 2025.

It's allowed me to see how witty, intelligent. and personable an individual can be regardless of any disability or barriers they may face."


Community Training Workshops
