We continue to coordinate our priorities with this strategy and complete ongoing reviews of current housing and identification of future needs.

Guided by our 2023 Blue Sky Philanthropy Fundraising Assessment and Recommendations report, we continue to execute, evaluate, and revise our long-term revenue strategy, including increasing Board fundraising capacity, managing volunteer and donor relationships, and monitoring community and organizational linkages. This ongoing review of our strategy map is crucial to these efforts, as is enhancing our Media Relations Strategy to reflect our impact and broaden our reach.

We will ensure continued effective stewardship and accountability.

Strategies informed by our Fundraising Assessment and Recommendations report highlight the importance of implementing our internal and external communications strategies and Board governance initiatives. We remain focused on effective board recruitment to fill vacancies and strengthen the board's capacity for leadership and strong governance. The Investment Committee continues to provide stewardship of investments to ensure the ongoing financial health and wellbeing of the Foundation.



ance's life has been shaped by extraordinary challenges. Born with 40% vision, he lost his sight completely after a series of operations caused by complications from having had Rubella. Lance had his first eye surgery at just 9 months old. Today, at 45 years old, Lance is deafblind, a condition that profoundly impacts his ability to communicate and connect with the world. He has also developed diabetes, which affects his mobility and requires him to use a wheelchair.

At 21 years old, Lance moved into a DeafBlind Ontario Services supported living home, where

he began receiving 24/7 personalized support. Professional intervenors, who act as a bridge between the person who is deafblind and the world around them, provide Lance with the visual and auditory information he needs to navigate his environment. This support has been vital in building his independence and creating meaningful social connections.

DeafBlind Ontario Services, one of the largest service providers in Ontario for people with sensory loss, has been instrumental in Lance's journey, providing tailored services to meet his unique needs, language, and goals.

Steven, Lance's father, played an important role in shaping the services his son benefits from today. As one of the founding members of DeafBlind Ontario Services, Steven and a group of dedicated parents came together to address the lack of resources available for individuals aging out of the school system when they reached the age of 21. Their advocacy efforts led to the creation of housing and support systems that have since transformed countless lives, including Lance's.

DeafBlind Ontario

assistive devices, and transportation solutions empowers individuals like Lance to live more independently and confidently.

Steven describes his son Lance as someone who truly enjoys life, "He loves being outdoors, feeling the wind on his face, and even in cold weather, he refuses to wear hats or gloves!" Steven laughs as he shares, "When taking a drive in the van, Lance likes to put the window down and wave his hand outside, which makes people think he's waving at them." Steven also shared that

despite Lance's limited hearing, music is a source of comfort for him, and he enjoys the connection that sounds bring when he wears his headphones.

Friendships have played a special role in Lance's life. Two classmates from his time at W. Ross MacDonald School, and who happened to live at the same supported living home, understood Lance's needs. Steven explains, "They often took his hand to guide him to the van during outings,

knowing that Lance could not see."

Initially, Lance used hand-over-hand sign language, a form of tactile sign language. Over time and through reinforcement of signs followed by an action,

Lance's understanding of sign language has grown. His father recalls the moment Lance learned to sign words like "drink," an important milestone that allowed him to express his needs effectively.

With the tailored support Lance receives, he has developed greater independence, embraced meaningful connections, and finds joy in daily life. Steven shares, "Lance loves coming home to see me, but the life he's built and the sense of belonging he feels in his own home make it a place where he truly thrives."

"I have some amazing memories from those events," Ashleigh recalls.


One particularly poignant memory involves Ashleigh's aunt, who attended a historic fundraising event called Indulge Your Senses. "My aunt was visiting from England and was able to join us. She was genuinely touched by the impact that DeafBlind Ontario Foundation has with the people they serve, and she had an amazingly fun night. My aunt recently passed away, and in her last few months, she often mentioned how much that experience meant to her," Ashleigh shares.

Ashleigh's dedication was also evident during the Come to Your Senses challenge, a pledge-based fundraising event. She participated in five back-to-back gym classes in one day, raising funds and awareness through social media. Ashleigh was pleasantly surprised that she inspired donations from people she had never met! The experience highlighted how personal passion can drive meaningful action and create community connections.





Together, we are creating a future full of possibilities.



Rising housing and construction costs affect our ability to expand and maintain these specialized homes. Your investment helps us renovate and repair aging infrastructure, build and purchase fully accessible homes, reach more communities across Ontario, and reduce mortgage debt — freeing funds for essential services. Accessible housing is the first step toward a life of independence and connection.

Specialized Equipment Fund – Enhancing Daily Life and Safety

Specialized equipment supports communication, mobility, and independence. From therapeutic bathtubs and ramps to assistive devices and home elevators, this equipment bridges the gap between isolation and engagement.

Gifts to this fund improve home safety, accessibility, communication, and dignity in daily life. With the right tools, individuals can fully participate in their homes and communities.

These unrestricted gifts allow us to be nimble and proactive, ensuring that no opportunity to improve lives is missed simply because funding isn't yet in place.



our fundraising initiatives and deepen engagement with valued donors and partners. While individual giving remains central, we will also diversify funding streams by seeking new grants,


developing corporate and community partnerships, and exploring innovative funding models while demonstrating the impact of contributions through regular updates.
