Strategic Plan 2023–2026

In 2025–2026, DeafBlind Ontario Foundation continued to advance the priorities of its 2023–2026 Strategic Plan, with a focus on sustainability, growth, and strong stewardship in support of our mission and the work of DeafBlind Ontario Services.

We will increase our capacity to manage and grow our housing and accommodation assets

Strengthening the Foundation’s housing and accommodation assets remained a key strategic priority. Accommodation and housing needs continue to be monitored, with a focus on ensuring existing and future accommodation solutions are sustainable, appropriate, and aligned with the evolving needs of people supported. In addition, early-stage planning advanced in priority growth regions, including Ottawa, where the Foundation explored potential future housing opportunities connected to major residential developments offering a mix of affordable and market rental units.

We will ensure continued effective stewardship and accountability

Strong governance and accountability remained central to the Foundation’s work. The Board and Investment Committee continued to provide oversight to support financial health and responsible management of resources, while Board recruitment and education strengthened leadership capacity. During the year, the Board initiated the 2027–2031 strategic planning process to support long-term readiness.

The Foundation continues to lead with our **Core Values** and **Foundational Principles**, reinforcing alignment and a consistent, person-centred approach to stewardship, growth, and impact.

We will increase our capacity to raise funds

The Foundation continued to strengthen its fundraising capacity by focusing on sustainability, leadership engagement, and effective donor stewardship. Building on our *2023 Fundraising Assessment and Recommendations* report, the Foundation has been actively using its guidance while working with an external fundraising consultant to refresh and strengthen the strategy, incorporating the perspectives of new employees and aligning it with the current fundraising landscape. These efforts, alongside ongoing donor engagement and diversification of revenue sources, are positioning the Foundation for long-term growth and resilience.

Letter from the Board Chair & CEO

Over the past year, DeafBlind Ontario Foundation has continued to grow and evolve, remaining steadfast in our commitment to the individuals we serve.

We are deeply grateful to our generous donors and partners who invest in the futures of people who are deafblind, as well as individuals with a developmental disability who are Deaf, hard of hearing, or who use non-traditional forms of communication.

At the heart of our work is a firm belief that every person's voice, choices, and lived experience must guide our actions. Thank you for your continued support and for helping raise significant funds that directly advance our mission.

Ottawa continues to be a priority region within our strategic growth plans. Building on our accommodation and housing strategy, we actively explored opportunities to expand our reach and increase access to appropriate housing. This included investigating high-level opportunities within major new developments across the Ottawa area that will offer a combination of affordable and market rental units in the coming years. These efforts are critical to ensuring the individuals we support can access safe, inclusive environments designed to meet their unique accessibility needs.

As we enter a new phase of growth, strengthening leadership and governance

remains a key focus. We are pleased to welcome four new Board members who will be joining us this year, bringing valuable expertise and fresh perspectives to our work. In support of strong governance practices, the Board participated in targeted learning sessions, including refining our elevator pitches and engaging in meaningful one-on-one fund development discussions with employees. We have also launched our 2027–2031 strategic planning process, which will help guide and align our efforts in the years ahead.

A significant highlight of the year was our annual #DoBlue campaign, held last June during National Deafblind Awareness Month. This initiative helped raise vital awareness across our communities and encouraged active participation by inviting supporters to post photos in blue to show their solidarity. The campaign was further strengthened by a Board-led matching commitment, in which Board members collectively matched the personal donation made by our CEO—demonstrating leadership and shared commitment to the Foundation's mission.

Our community presence also saw exciting growth through an addition of a new bingo permit in Val Caron (Sudbury), Ontario. This expansion into the area's charitable gaming has not only provided a new stream of revenue but has also served as a vital platform for outreach. Through this initiative, we have welcomed new volunteers into the Foundation family

and reached a broader audience of people who are now learning about our specialized services for the first time.

Throughout the year, DeafBlind Ontario Services and the Foundation continued to embed the foundational principles of **Person-Centered Dedication** and **Infinite Possibilities**, established in 2024/2025. Alongside our core values—**Pursuit of Excellence**, **Collective Success**, **Fearless Empowerment**, and **Accountability in Action**—these principles guided our efforts to unlock potential and support individuals in living their best lives. Your generosity continues to bridge critical gaps, helping fund specialized equipment, essential accessibility upgrades, wheelchair-accessible vehicles, and meaningful recreational programs.

Because of you, our mission is not only sustained, but strengthened—reaching further and making a deeper difference every day.

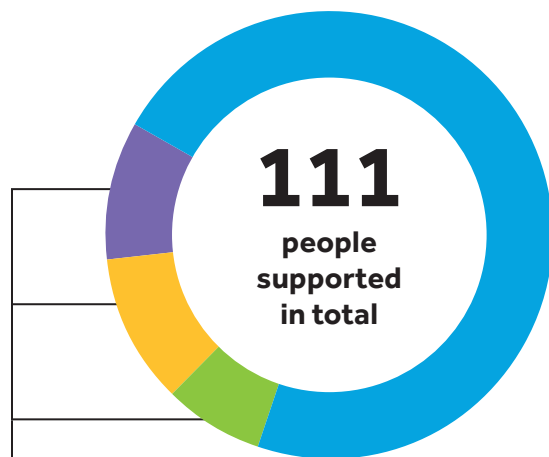


Transforming Lives, Together

Living Life On His Own Terms

DeafBlind Ontario Services' Supported Independent Living (SIL) program provides customized support for people who are deafblind or living with a developmental disability who are Deaf, hard of hearing, or use non-traditional forms of communication, and live semi-independently with minimal support.

Doug, a Deaf individual who communicates using American Sign Language (ASL), thrived for many years in SIL, where tailored communication support and personalized planning helped him stay connected and engaged in daily life.

As Doug began experiencing age-related changes in both vision and hearing, his support needs evolved. Now deafblind, Doug recently moved into one of our supported living homes, gaining access to 24/7 specialized support while still maintaining the independence he deeply values.

Donor generosity makes transitions like Doug's possible, funding accessible housing, communication supports, and skilled intervenors who help individuals make their own choices and live life on their own terms.

Peterborough Housing Update!

Thanks to you, Crowley House in Peterborough has become a shining example of what accessible, person-centered housing can be. After extensive renovations, three individuals officially moved into their new home in June 2025, marking a major milestone in expanding safe, barrier-free housing.



Phase 1 Upper Level—Complete

Transforming the upper level into a fully accessible space, including widened hallways and doorways, automatic bedroom door openers for safety, a new garden-door roll-out to the back deck to enjoy outdoor spaces, and a full elevator installation.

Phase 2 Lower Level—In Progress

Renovations have started with a focus on completing a lower-level apartment suitable for one individual.

With continued donor support, Crowley House will further expand its capacity and remain a model of person-centered, accessible housing.

Bridging the Gap to Accessibility

For Corey, every community experience begins with anticipation.

With the support of Lenni, Corey's Certified Deafblind Intervenor Specialist (CDBIS), community outings are carefully planned using a personalized communication system. Corey uses a tactile calendar with objects that signal what's planned for the day ahead, helping him understand the activity and prepare. As the moment approaches to leave his house, Corey's excitement builds. His posture straightens, his eyes widen, and he begins to vocalize. Non-verbal cues like this show Lenni that he is already engaged in the experience to come.

Corey is deafblind and has a complex medical condition, and these moments are made possible by thoughtful planning and the right supports. Each outing requires careful coordination, accessible transportation, equipment, arrangements for accessible seating, and effective communication to ensure his safety and participation. With this support, Corey experiences the world around him more fully and without barriers.

On a recent trip to Toronto, Corey visited Medieval Times, Ripley's Aquarium, and the Hockey Hall of Fame. At Medieval Times, the music, armour, and castle surroundings created an immersive experience. Lenni shared that Corey laughed and leaned into the energy of the room until his paper crown tumbled off mid-cheer!

Throughout the trip, Corey showed his enjoyment through movement, vocalization, and touch, reaching out and responding to the world around him. His enthusiasm drew people in, and employees and visitors smiled as they shared in the moment. As Lenni says, "his joy is contagious, and people feel it."

Using adapted sign language, including tactile sign and simplified LSQ (Langue des signes québécoise), Lenni shared information moment by moment, giving Corey context, supporting choice, and allowing him to respond to what was happening around him.

Corey's interests guide his activities. He is especially drawn to sensory-rich environments like swimming and live events where sound, movement, and atmosphere come together. Here, he can engage in ways that are meaningful to him. Corey isn't just an observer; he's a participant. His presence serves as a reminder that everyone has the right to participate and be acknowledged.

Thanks to the generosity of donors, people like Corey can access accessible transportation, specialized equipment, and life-enriching experiences that support independence and full participation in community life. Together, we're removing barriers and building communities where every person is celebrated and supported.



A Place to Feel Safe

Sometimes the most meaningful moments happen quietly—when an urgent need is met with compassion, care, and swift action.

DeafBlind Ontario Services was recently approached to support an individual who urgently needed a safe place to call home.

Their living situation had become unstable, and without immediate intervention, their well-being was at risk. For people who are deafblind, as well as those living with a developmental disability who are Deaf, hard of hearing or use non-traditional forms of communication, securing appropriate housing is rarely simple. True accessibility depends on more than shelter alone—it requires safety, affordability, thoughtful design, and access to specialized supports that are not always easy to find.

Responding quickly in moments like these is essential. When safety and stability are at risk, waiting isn't an option.

Thanks to the generous support from donors, we were able to act.

Working closely with our services teams, we moved quickly to design and prepare an accessible apartment tailored to this individual's unique needs. Every decision

was guided by our person-centred service model, with careful attention given to how the individual communicates and interacts with their environment. Layout, safety considerations, and accessibility modifications were thoughtfully designed to support independence, dignity, privacy, and comfort.

This home was created not only to meet urgent, immediate needs, but to also support long-term well-being. Built with adaptability in mind, it can continue to meet the individual's changing needs over time—offering stability today and into the future. Accessible housing is about far more than physical space. It's about creating an environment where someone can make their own choices, feel grounded, and build routines that support overall wellbeing.

For individuals with sensory loss, housing stability can be transformative. It becomes a foundation for building independence, dignity, and meaningful connections.

Although DeafBlind Ontario Services receives provincial funding, it doesn't meet all the needs of the people we support. Flexible, donor-directed funding makes it possible to respond when circumstances are urgent and time is critical. Today, this individual is on the path toward stability in a home designed for their safety and independence. Their story reflects what is possible when emergency response is paired with person-centered support and thoughtful investments in accessible housing.

This is the impact of compassionate giving.

Accessible Housing Fund

Foundational Support for Independence

DeafBlind Ontario Services' supported living environments go beyond shelter, offering purpose-built homes with round-the-clock support that enable individuals to live confidently and safely.

This pillar supports the ongoing care of existing homes while creating opportunities to expand accessible housing in new communities. Investments help strengthen long-term housing stability, modernize and maintain infrastructure, and ensure these homes remain sustainable for years to come.

Accessible housing is not just a place to live—it is the foundation that allows people to build meaningful, connected lives.

Specialized Equipment

Enhancing Safety, Communication and Daily Life

Specialized equipment plays a critical role in enabling independence and safety within supported living environments. From adapted bathrooms and lifts to communication technology and mobility supports, these tools make daily activities more accessible and dignified.

Gifts to this pillar ensure homes remain fully equipped to meet evolving needs, reduce barriers within living spaces, and support participation in everyday routines. The right equipment allows individuals to engage more fully in their homes and communities—safely, confidently, and with greater autonomy.

Transportation Fund

Connecting People to Opportunity

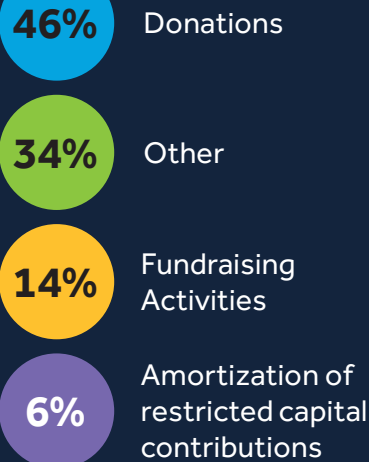

Together, We Create Lasting Impact

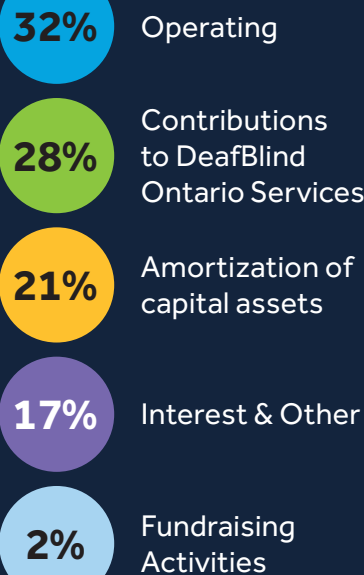
